Attendance in Wirral Schools...

The need for regular school attendance is given a high priority by all Wirral Schools.

Regular attendance is defined as: `in accordance with the rules prescribed by the school.'

In Wirral schools, this is interpreted as **every day that the school** requires a child to attend unless the absence has been approved by the Headteacher.



Responsibilities and Expectations of Parents & Carers...

- To ensure that your child attends school every day that school is open unless there is a genuine and unavoidable reason that prevents them from this. We appreciate that children do get poorly and at times, the best place is at home.
- To ensure that your child arrives on time every day <u>school starts at 8:45am</u>. A reason should be offered for any lateness.
- To inform us as soon as possible, by phone, email (<u>schooloffice@liscardprimary.wirral.sch.uk</u>), or in person if your child is unable to attend school along with the reason for absence.
- To make medical appointments outside school hours wherever possible and to inform school in advance of any medical appointments that cannot be scheduled out of school time.
- To talk to us at school as soon as possible if your child becomes reluctant to come to school for any reason, or if there are any other issues impacting on their school attendance. This is so that any problems can be quickly identified and overcome, or additional support put in place.
- To take family holidays during school holiday periods, and to be aware that <u>there is NO entitlement to withdraw</u> <u>children for authorised leave of absence during term time</u>. Any request for leave of absence during term time should be <u>made in writing and in advance</u> to the Headteacher. There is a form available if a request needs to be made.

Changes in Government Regulations mean that as of 1st September 2013, there is no entitlement for parents to withdraw theirchildren for authorised leave of absence in term time. A Headteacher can only grant leave if there are exceptional circumstances surrounding the request. If the Headteacher is satisfied that there are exceptional circumstances to warrant thegranting of leave of absence, the Headteacher will then determine the number of school days a child can be away from school. Exceptional circumstances are defined as rare, significant, unavoidable and short, with unavoidable meaning an eventthat could not reasonably by scheduled at another time.
